Dear Governor McKee:

The Department of Housing is pleased to submit the below report on the activities of the Interagency Council on Homelessness pursuant to § 40-17-4.

The Interagency Council on Homelessness reconvened for its first meeting in over seven years in December 2024 and has had monthly meetings since. Reviving the Interagency Council on Homelessness is aligned with the 2024 Housing Organization Report recommendations, which envisions the Interagency Council on Homelessness and a new Interagency Council on Housing Production and Preservation serving as key coordinating entities to align state agency processes, resources, and programs to achieve strategic goals related to homelessness and housing, respectively.

The Interagency Council on Homelessness has focused on the following topics at the recent meetings as it works to re-establish itself and ensure shared understanding of the current system across all member agencies:

- December 2024: Housing Organizational Plan proposals and the Municipal Homelessness Support Initiative.
- January 2025: Mapping resources and activities across member agencies related to preventing and addressing homelessness.
- February 2025: Department of Housing updates on expansion of temporary emergency shelter capacity and discussion of proposed new revenue streams for homelessness in the Governor's proposed budget.
- March 2025: Presentation from the Continuum of Care on the activities of the CoC and its relation to the work of the Interagency Council.

At each meeting, the Council has also received valuable public comment about the state of homelessness and opportunities to improve the system to better serve people experiencing homelessness.

Following up on the January meeting and using planning funding from State Fiscal Recovery Funds, the Department of Housing has engaged a consulting firm to map the federal and state resources to prevent and address homelessness in Rhode Island. This mapping will provide foundational information from which the Interagency Council can identify opportunities to optimize resources, reduce duplication of efforts, and better serve Rhode Islanders experiencing homelessness. This is particularly vital as the federal funding outlook is increasingly uncertain and one-time pandemic resources have come to an end. This mapping will also inform the development of an updated strategic plan to end homelessness.

On an annual basis, the RI Continuum of Care is required to set the policies for a Point in Time (PIT) count of all people experiencing homelessness in the state. The most recently available data from the PIT is attached to this report. HUD has set policies for data collection and approved count methodologies. The PIT count must occur during the last 10 days of January each year, with the exact dates varying slightly from year to year. This count typically lasts for one night, although some communities may extend it to cover multiple nights to ensure a more accurate count. The duration is designed to capture a snapshot of homelessness on a specific night to gather data on the number of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the community.

The Department of Housing is working on statutory language to effectuate the recommendations of the 2024 Housing Organization Report including proposed changes to the structure of the Interagency Council on Homelessness, such as clarifying that the Secretary of Housing is the chair of the council.


Night of January 24, 2024 - Persons Experiencing Homelessness

5 Year Trends: Overall


The number of people experiencing homelessness increased 35% from the 2023 count. The largest increase was within Persons Unsheltered and in Emergency Shelter.

Since last year, there are 47% more people in family households.





The overall count of individuals experiencing homelessness has increased by 28% since last year.





5 Year Trend: Unsheltered


Unsheltered Homelessness increased 35% since 2022, since 2020 it has increased 394%

5 Year Trend: Unaccompanied Youth and Young Adults


Young Adults (age 18-24) increased, particularly in YHDP Transitional Housing projects.

The number of Chronically Homeless persons increased by 20% from last year. This graph does not include people in transitional housing, because by definition they are no longer counted as chronically homeless once entering transitional housing.





5 Year Trend: RRH in Housing Search

There were many households experiencing homelessness who had obtained a Rapid ReHousing voucher on the night of the Point in Time Count. Due to the extreme lack of affordable housing they were still looking for a unit to utilize their voucher. As a result, they are counted in the shelter and/or unsheltered count.








